Debbie called upon Mary Jo Monten to introduce our guest speaker, Bethany Eglestin, Director of Development for AZ Helping Hands. Our club sewed 110 drawstring bags for foster children in just January, with more to come. Bethany was amazed at the size of our group. Other groups number 10-20 people and we have reached the 250 mark this year.

AZ Helping Hands, in business for 25 years, is the largest supplier of goods for foster children in Arizona. There is a warehouse filled with goods for children: a toy land, boutique, beds. There are now 12,000 foster children in our state. They also service 22 tribes. According to Bethany, it is a challenge getting to kids when and where needed, and that is an immediate need to respond. People may not be able to get to the warehouse, a concern that the agency hopes to address. It takes many community partners, of which RnS is just one. Our recent project validates to foster children that people care about them at an emotionally low point in their lives, as they experience loss of home, school and local friends, AZ Helping Hands is in a different category than 501(3)(c) charitable organizations; donations can be \$500 for individuals and \$1000 for couples when filing taxes.
